Full Title

- 1. Great Voyages of Discovery**
Discovery of the Americas and the evolution of human history. Explorers like Columbus and Magellan convinced that they were discovering new worlds of nature. This attitude led to the discovery of the Americas by Irish doctor Hans Sloane.
- 2. Natural Medicine**
In 1687 Hans Sloane became the personal physician to King James II and his botanical and natural history collections. He documented Jamaica's natural history and the medicinal uses of its plants.
- 3. Fascination with Nature**
Interest in nature was widespread in the 18th century. Hans Sloane's work in Jamaica laid the foundations of imperial botany and the study of natural history. The home produce from the colonies began to clash with the interests of the British.
- 4. The National Museum**
By the time Hans Sloane died, the world's greatest collection of natural history specimens, the majority of which survive today, was moved to the British Museum. It was the first time that a collection of natural history specimens appeared across Europe.
- 5. Subterranean Worlds**
Directly beneath Paris, France, lies a vast network of underground passages linked by a series of caves and tunnels. Interest in the items found in these caves began in the 18th century, and the items were once living things.
