Dear all,

Priority registration for our current students has begun! This means current students have an opportunity to register for fall 2023 classes and continue their education journey. If you have advisees but have not heard from them, reach out, track them down and review their course schedules and the progress they are making toward their degree. We cannot wait passively for students to contact us. We – You must reach out.

If advising students is not part of your "normal" work at LC State, you still play an important role in encouraging and supporting students in their continued journey. Be assertive. Be bold. Ask the students you meet if they have their fall 2023 schedules planned. Ask them if they have met with their advisors. Ask them if they need any help with the priority registration process. These efforts reveal what makes LC State so special – that personal touch and the genuine interest we take in our students' educational pursuits.

A couple weeks ago the Lewiston Tribune printed a terrific article about LC State and our internationalized tennis program. If you haven't read it, you'll find it here (note: subscription required). The article described the connection Coach Kai makes with prospective student-athletes and the reasons they shared about choosing LC State. Their rationale for attending LC is a testament to exactly what we, as a campus community, have been working to engage in terms of personal outreach and connection — working to convert applications to enrollment for fall. For those who cannot access the article, here's a quote from it.

"I think coach Kai had a lot to do with my decision (to play here)," said Daniel Tevez, a sophomore on the men's team from El Salvador. "He's the coach that wanted me the most. And I took into account the tennis program, my major, the city and I decided just to try something new here ... through the whole process, there were other schools, but coach Kai was the one who seemed a bit more not concerned with financial situations or stuff like that, or level of play. He just wanted to know you as a person, how you are and if you're willing to work hard and put in the work, so that's why I came here."

So far, fall 2023 admission applications are up, and there are promising indications of an increase in new students for next year. Transfer and international student applications are up. Housing applications are holding even, and we have made more institutional scholarship offers than any time in the past. But, as our own student surveys tell us, it will be our direct outreach to these students that will make the difference. When these students get that note of encouragement or phone call from you, it tells them that they are valued and reinforces that our college is unique among the options they are considering. It quite literally says to them, to paraphrase Tevez's comment, we are the school that wants them the most.

We can take nothing for granted when it comes to enrollment. The competition for students is strong. Our spring 2023 census data showed a slight decrease in our overall enrollment compared with last spring (down about 1% – which is still better than national trends among regional comprehensive institutions – but not the direction we must go). Now is our opportunity to fully reverse the pandemic enrollment trend. Nothing less than all our efforts, every one of us, every day, will be and are required. It is time to Warrior up!
