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President's Message

Dear all,

This week I will travel to Boise to present our facilities needs requests to the Idaho Permanent Building Fund Advisory Council (PBFAC). This Council works on behalf of the Idaho Division of Public Works, which oversees statewide facilities management, maintenance and construction. The PBFAC is responsible for considering, vetting and recommending funding (or not) to the Legislature associated with state agency facility needs. As you are likely aware, LC State, like its Idaho sister four-year institutions, is considered a state agency. This year our funding requests (categorized as required by PBFAC as capital requests, alterations and repairs and ADA compliance) focus on preserving and restoring campus facilities. Our requests, which largely reflect infrastructure needs identified through our recently completed deferred maintenance study, total in excess of \$30 million. Yes, it is a lot; and there is really no way for me to know at this point what kind of support we can expect. That said, preserving and restoring our 128-plus-year-old campus, a true Idaho gem, is key to our ability to serve our education mission and the citizens of Idaho into the next 100 years; and so this week I will begin to make the case for state support to help address our deferred maintenance and infrastructure needs.

Oct. 1 Vaccination Update: 781 LC students are vaccinated – most of which are full-time face-to-face degree-seeking students. While overall (full time and part time considered) our student vaccination rate is hovering between 25-30%ish, when disaggregated by some or all face-to-face, degree-seeking status, the percentage of our students in this category closes in on 40%, and for our resident students it is near 50%. Among employees we are quite literally an island of relative safety compared to our state and region. Our employee vaccination rate is around 70%, and if we add in medical exemptions (meaning individuals who have had COVID within the past 90 days) our percentage climbs to just over 74%. I remain hopeful that 80% or better can be realized in the not too distant future, and am incredibly proud of our faculty and staff for demonstrating their care for each other, our collective health and safety, and desire to do all we can to bring the pandemic to an end.

- Coronavirus Updates & Risk Level: For the latest coronavirus updates and information
 visit www.lcsc.edu/coronavirus. In accordance with its Operational.levels.Matrix, LC State's
 current risk level is: Moderate.
 - Cases Update: Currently there are 5 active cases and 1 student in isolation in campus housing.
 - Reporting Line: If someone believes they were exposed to someone with an active case of COVID-19 or believes they are infected themselves, they should contact the campus COVID-19 Reporting Line at 208-792-2002 for guidance.
 - Vaccine Availability: To schedule an appointment with Public Health Idaho North
 Central District visit www.idahoprepmod.com or call 208-799-3100. Because we are
 delivering education face to face, LC State employees qualify for vaccine booster shots.
 - Continuing Weekly Testing: LC State will plan to continue its weekly surveillance testing program through the fall semester (assuming the state supply of tests continues to be available), and is working to implement onboarding testing during the month of January for the spring semester.
 - Vault Tests Accuracy: The Vault Test is a saliva-based, RT-qPCR test that detects specific genes from the SARS-CoV-2 virus the virus that causes COVID-19. The test is very sensitive to the presence of SARS-CoV-2, with 98% of tests providing either a positive or negative result. The test can detect fewer than 10 copies of viral genes per milliliter of saliva and can detect the virus within two days of infection. Because it tests specific to SARS-CoV-2, it does not test for the flu.
 - Staff/Offices Tasked with Distributing Masks: The college has a limited supply of masks to provide when people forget or otherwise need them, but these are primarily intended for campus guests who were not aware of the campus mask policy before coming to campus. Offices that are distributing face masks should be mindful of this and monitor how often an individual student is coming in to get a one-time use face mask. Individual judgment about distributing a mask to current students more than once will be respected but it is perfectly acceptable to send a student back to their vehicle, apartment, or dorm room to retrieve their own masks if they make repeated requests.

In 2019, President Pemberton proclaimed October as Domestic Violence Awareness Month at Lewis-Clark State College. This proclamation provides an excellent opportunity for our campus to learn more about preventing domestic violence, bystander intervention, and to show support for the local organizations and college faculty and staff providing critical advocacy, services, and assistance to survivors. Throughout the month of October, you will see various symbols of support across campus from ribbons and shadow people to information cards about healthy relationships. - October is Cybersecurity Awareness Month: The STOP. THINK. CONNECT. Campaign
 created by the Cybersecurity & Infrastructure Security Agency is a national public awareness

 safer and more secure online. Cybersecurity is a shared responsibility. We each have to do our
 part to keep the internet safe. When we all take simple steps to be safer online, it makes using
 the internet a more secure experience for everyone. Five every day steps to improve online
 safety:
 - o Enable multi-factor authentication whenever possible.
 - Consider using a passphrase instead of a password. A passphrase is a sentence-like string of words used instead of a password and is longer than a traditional password, easy to remember, and difficult to crack.
 - Keep a clean machine. Update the security software, operating system, and web browser on all of your internet-connected devices.
 - When in doubt, throw it out. Links in email and online posts are often the way cybercriminals compromise your computer. If it looks suspicious (even if you know the source), delete it.
 - Share with care. Limit the amount of personal information you share online and use privacy settings to avoid sharing information widely.
- Mental Health Resource: A reminder that there's a new mental health resource available for all LC State students, faculty and staff. Therapy Assisted Online (TAO) includes over 150 brief, effective, self-help educational sessions covering over 50 common topics and skills related to mental health, wellness, and substance use issues. - Seeding Our Tomorrows: "In addition to our 'normal' recruit efforts and targets, beginning this fall Admissions has embarked on an aggressive campaign to leverage technology to initiate and enhance high school recruitment connections in regions with population demographics that are largely rural (e.g., parts of western Washington and Oregon, Montana, Nevada, North Dakota, South Dakota, parts of Utah, Alaska and Hawaii). The initiative specifically targets communities with populations of 50,000 or less. Letters and information packets are being drafted to send to high school principals from me, as President, simultaneous with information from our Admissions staff to high school counselors. Admissions staff will follow-up by hosting virtual high school counselor sessions via Zoom in early November, as well as student-focused Zoom sessions. While certainly some of the high schools identified are schools who know us and with whom we have longstanding recruit relationships, for a fair number, however, this targeted outreach and focused connection will be new.
