Students must have completed senior research one and already have completed chapter one to be allowed to enroll in Senior Research two which will complete senior research requirements. Senior standing, KIN-381 (Test and Measurements) or a statistics class must be completed before senior research.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Applies basic research concepts and processes to implement, analyze, and evaluate a Kinesiology related research project. Students communicate findings in writing and in a public presentation. Senior research is designed to expose students to current topic information in their field or specialization. Depending on the emphasis and specialization of the student's career path three different options are available for students to complete their research and presentations. This section the student will be finishing one of the following research projects listed below. This course also provides the opportunity for each student to present their research in a professional forum before their peers and also to publish their research, if approved by research committee board. This course is designed to assist the student in analyzing and collecting data along with developing professional presentation skills.

Option 1: An independent research project including a review of the related literature, collection and analysis of data and a final oral presentation. The course is writing intensive.

Option 2: A teaching aid such as video, coaching booklet, promotional package and aid, or any additional video or professional presentation related to your area of emphasis which is prepared by researching the most current recommendations.

Option 3: Professional fitness program designed for specific populations based on the most current information in the fitness field related to disease prevention and health promotion.

All three options require a review of literature and a written and oral presentation. Students can work in groups no larger than three to complete senior research projects and presentations. A rubric will be used to assess each individual's contributions to the completed

project. Completion of final abstract is due on March 15 and presentations will take place during dead week along with the campus wide research symposium.

PURPOSE OF THE COURSE:

This course is the capstone course for Kinesiology majors. Senior level students enrolled in Kinesiology 499 will be asked to demonstrate their research, writing, speaking and critical thinking skills gained during their undergraduate studies. The course is designed to prepare graduates for understanding and applying current research to their future careers in kinesiology and the health sciences.

REQUIRED TEXT:

Students will use library resources and the internet to investigate their personal research topic. Additional materials related to study design; methods and statistics will be provided by the instructors.

METHODS OF INSTRUCTION:

Lecture	1 5%
Classroom discussion and activities	15%

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

This course will assist students in basic research and presentation methods including: *Course Competencies:*

- 1. Conduct a quantitative or qualitative research project or a approved Kinesiology project listed form above.
- 2. Differentiate methods and parameters for analyzing quantitative and qualitative data utilizing correct data collection and analysis procedures.
- 3. Describe strategies for interpreting results in quantitative and qualitative studies or for developing a Kinesiology related project.
- 4. Discuss and justify the importance of using published research to improve knowledge in the kinesiology field.
- 5. Describe how your research findings impact kinesiology field.
- 6. Produce a written report of your research study.

- 7. Demonstrating visual technology skills during an oral presentation
- 8. Utilize professional communication skills to present your research findings in a senior research symposium.
